Finally, I would like to say a massive thank you to all of the people involved in our district for your hard work and support for me over what has been a testing 2 years. The next year will not be easy as we get back to the new normal for scouting but I feel confident that we will be able to look back at the next AGM and say that we have moved forwards and are still providing great provision for all ages in all sections.

Campsite Report



As you would expect with the lockdowns and restrictions, Drummers Lodge has had an unusually quiet year.

When face to face meetings were once again allowed, we saw local Scout and Guides groups making use of the outdoor space. The marquee has been a great addition to the site, due to the COVID restrictions it has allowed the site to be used safely and provide some shelter from the elements when needed.

Although income from camping fees dramatically reduced, the support of the retail leisure and hospitality grants and more recently the local restrictions funds has kept the income up. The campsite has a relatively small amount of regular outgoings. Additional planned expenditure was on the improvement projects started pre pandemic. Overall the financial security needed to maintain it as a viable asset has been there throughout the pandemic.

When allowed a small team of committed volunteers have been working to maintain the site. The gravel area for the marquee was completed and more recently the middle pitch has been re-soiled to help with drainage. Mark Tippett has kept on top of maintaining the trees and bushes around the site, as well as opening up an area at the bottom of the site ideal as a survival camping zone.

The development plan for Drummers is due to be revisited, and that will set the direction for how the site continues to be improved and where investment is made. The site is here primarily for the provision of the District, so any ideas or suggestions from the groups who use the site are always welcome.

With the advent of the new rules requiring 'Getting Started' basic modules to be completed alongside securing a DBS, the uptake for training has been more encouraging this year albeit only in terms of on-line e-learning modules. Three of my four groups (5th Newquay, 1st Newquay and St Eval) are fully compliant with the minimum requirements. St Enoder has some new leaders who have yet to complete the key modules but they have been encouraged to do so and have until September until further follow-up action is required. Beyond basic requirements there has been little progress but some leaders have shown a lot of initiative and worked really hard to source training elsewhere in order to complete wood-badge training. Opportunities to catch up with first aid (both on-line and practical) have gone down well and it is hoped that we can reduce the backlog in the coming year.

As you can imagine this report will be a little different than usual. With the shop hardly open due to Covid. That has had an effect on sales which have dramatically reduced.


On the plus side since we have re-opened and fairly busy with Beavers, Cubs and Scouts who should have moved sections buying uniforms for their new sections.

Events

The Mid Cornwall events team have had a quiet year. All the large scale events we usually put on for Cornish Scouts have had to be cancelled or postponed. Despite keeping a close eye on the changing situations and readiness levels and having plans in place that could adapt events to allow them to run, the restrictions have ultimately meant we've not been able to hold a Beaver challenge, Cub Challenge, Coast to Coast or Kernopoly. The annual Scout and Explorer pilgrimage to Brownsea Island has also not taken place for two consecutive years. And sadly a last minute extension of the restrictions in July, put a stop to the adults skills weekend.

A new SAS section 'SAS events' has been opened on Compass. All our helpers and supporters will be added to this section. This will ensure any adults who don't have a role registered anywhere else can be recorded and we will be able to see that all our events team have up to date mandatory training and DBS checks.

Jamboree fund
